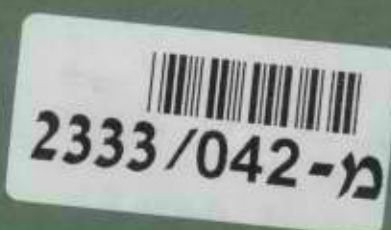

INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMPLETING THE QUESTIONNAIRE.

1. Under 'Products' state principal products only.
2. Column (3) — Age — State age last birthday.
3. Column (4) — 'National' group — State Arab or Jew or other according to the employee's own declaration.
4. Column (5) — Occupation — State 'Unskilled' for each unskilled employee. Specify precisely the nature of the skilled occupation; for example not 'Fitter' but M.T. Fitter or Locomotive Fitter; Fitter's Assistant if the employee is not fully trained etc. A worker engaged in repetitive work at one machine is to be classed as 'unskilled'.
5. Column (6) — Degree of skill — State for unskilled 'N.A.' (Not applicable). For skilled employees state A or B or C or D or E according to the following definitions.
 - A. Highly skilled — a tradesman of a considerable period of experience who can not only be entrusted with intricate and specialised work, but possesses the ability to direct learners. This class includes foremen.
 - B. Fully competent — an experienced tradesman who has the ability to perform specialised work but does not necessarily possess powers of direction. Should not require supervision.
 - C. Competent — An average tradesman of experience who can be trusted to carry out all but the more intricate specialised tasks. Very little supervision of his work necessary.
 - D. Routine tradesman — He must have had enough experience to be able to undertake a tradesman's job without *constant* supervision. The "hack" worker of long experience would fall into this class.
 - E. Learner — A junior at the trade with little experience. (It should be noted that the length of experience limiting a junior to this classification will vary as between the different trades). He requires constant supervision and direction.
6. Column (7) — Experience — State *total* experience at the trade *under present and former employers* in completed years and fractions of year to nearest quarter or months for experience of less than one year. For example 3½ Y or 5 M where Y means years, and M means months.

As an ex-soldier who served in H.M. Forces for over 5 years during the War (Army No P/1382, RASC, in the rank of Sergeant) I feel encouraged to apply to Your Excellency in a matter vital to my future.

What remained of my family is living now in Australia. It was always my desire to join them and to settle down there together with my wife, Mrs. Stefania Freiwillicg.

I am not in possession of the necessary Landing Permit and, with my savings and some money sent by my family, I have just the necessary funds to pay the passage for my wife and myself. The boat is sailing at the end of October from Port Said.

In order, however, to go on board ship in that port, an Egyptian Transit visa together with a guarantee of £ 200 to be paid in to the Egyptian Consulate in Jerusalem until our arrival in Australia (when it will be returned), is required.

I have no such sum at my disposal, and no

friends in this country who could advance it.

In consequence, through lack of these £200 guarantee, I may be unable to leave, and my whole future endangered. It being exceedingly difficult to obtain a job here, I would have to spend my savings on living expenses, which in turn would make my voyage impossible.

May I, therefore, respectfully beg your Excellency to help me in this matter so that the necessity of paying in of the £200 in respect of my wife and myself be waived, thus enabling us to proceed on the voyage without delay.

I trust that Your Excellency will forgive my troubling you with this matter, and will be kind enough to help an ex-service man on his way to build his and his family's future, for which I shall be deeply grateful.
